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The Eustace Families Association was formed in 1976 with the objectives of:

Preserving for posterity the considerable knowledge now held in the histories of families originating in Flanders and the British Isles who bear the name "Eustace" or spelling variants thereof and of their descendants throughout the world.

Encouraging and assisting namesakes to research the story of their immediate and extended families and to disseminate the knowledge gained to those interested.

Developing and extending friendship and understanding between namesakes and welcoming visitors from overseas.

The Eustace Families Association was formed in the United Kingdom by the late Donald W. Eustace of Chiswick (London), and other family members. Following the death of Donald Eustace in 1993, the Eustace Families Association took a brief hiatus. In 1995, David Eustace of Cheltenham, Gloucestershire, England and Ronald Eustice of Savage, Minnesota, USA began to correspond via e-mail and the Eustace Families Association was resurrected. Eustace Families Musters (Reunions) have been held in 1979 (Pyrton), 1981 (Bledlow), 1983 (Watlington), 1985 (Lambeth) and 1999 (Watlington). The Great Eustace Gathering was held at Ballymore Eustace, Ireland in 2009.

The Eustice family of Waseca County, Minnesota has had well-attended family gatherings on numerous occasions. In 2011 Eustice families of New Jersey held a gathering with over 100 in attendance.

Beginning in 2006, the Eustace Families Association began gathering Y-chromosome DNA data on male namesakes of various origins. To date more than 165 namesakes have submitted DNA samples. DNA profiles of 16 to 67 markers have been compared. Contact Ronald Eustice to participate in the program.

Thanks to Terry Diebel of Mendota Heights, Minnesota, we continue with the four part series of the Eustace families of County Clare, Ireland that began in April 2013. Terry has traced her Eustace ancestral line from the townland of Confey, County Kildare in the 1400s through the 1650s when the family was dispossessed and forced to take refuge in Kilmacduane, County Clare. This is a remarkable story of a noble and wealthy family that was forced to flee for their lives. There is an Irish saying, *"To Hell or Connaught."* In this case the proud Eustaces of Confey chose Clare. They are still there today but have been unsure how each branch may or may not be related. Y-chromosome DNA testing has clearly determined that all members of the Clare family are near matches from which we can conclude that they descend from the five Eustaces from Confey who lost their valuable land in Kildare and were forcibly transplanted to Clare more than 350 years ago. Also interesting is that the DNA profiles of Clare Eustaces closely match other Eustace lines with roots in Carlow, Dublin, Kildare, Longford, Offaly, and Wicklow.

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An Ireland Trip?

Several have asked when the next Eustace Families Association trip to Ireland will be? It is time to determine the interest in such a trip and we'd like to hear from you.

The Great Eustace Gathering was held at Ballymore Eustace, Ireland in 2009. Sixteen namesakes from five US states, Newfoundland, Canada and Norway spent a week touring Dublin, Kildare and Carlow. Every day was an opportunity to view places that the Eustaces owned or built when the family held large estates. Following the main event, there was an opportunity for side trips, to Clare and Longford.

Since that time, many more personal contacts and new discoveries have been made. A repeat of popular places visited on the previous trip will be a good starting point.

The Cover: During August and early September, I travelled to Uruguay and Argentina. I was an International 4-H Youth Exchange (IFYE) delegate to Uruguay in 1967-68. While in Uruguay, Margaret and I renewed many friendships with members of host families.

One of the highlights was the visit to Argentina where I visited with Guillermo Eustace and his wife Carla Valles who live in Buenos Aires. Guillermo's great grandfather Michael Eustace (1863-1906) was born in Dublin, Ireland and came to Argentina in 188 with his wife Catherine Byrne and two very small children. Michael was employed by the firm of Duggan Hermanos which was founded in the 1860s by Michael, Thomas and John Duggan, Natives of Ballymahon, County Longford, Ireland. The Duggans became very wealthy in the trade of sheep and cattle hides. More than 2000 Irish emigrants came to Argentina to work for the Duggans.

Pictured on the cover are Santiago and Victoria Eustace Valles, the children of Guillermo and Carlos. It is customary in Argentina to use both parents surnames thus Eustace from the paternal side and Valles from the maternal side.

Who Was Who: John Evan Hardy Saywell (formerly John Evan Hardy Eustace)

I joined Nicholson Graham & Jones (NGJ) as an articled clerk in 1970. In those days, articled clerks were put in a small corner of a partner's room to listen and learn and to run errands and do drafting for the partner. I had just left law school and university and had no idea what I was supposed to be doing. John Saywell was very kind to me.

John Saywell was a very large man, well over 20 stone (280 pounds), and, to be frank, not very prepossessing. Most of the staff were scared stiff of him. However, after a few days, we just got on very well. He used to forgive my excesses when, as a young man, I stayed out all night and fell asleep on my desk after lunch. In return, I used to discuss history, philosophy and politics with him, as he had a wish to get things off his chest, and, anyway, I enjoyed all these subjects as well. Somehow, and I really don't know when, we did just enough work to get by! My wife agrees that he really had a heart of gold, but was very shy.

John Saywell was formidably clever. After serving in the Australian army during the Second World War, he decided to settle in England and became a Chancery barrister. Sadly, despite his brains and his energy, work did not flow his way and he abandoned the Bar to become a solicitor. In due course, he became a partner at a firm called Laytons and then moved over to NGJ as a partner in the early 1960s. There he established a small department dealing with tax, pensions, wills and trusts. He didn't much like dealing with small things, but he loved complex and challenging matters, and was often brought in by other partners, not only for his technical expertise, but also to analyze and sort out difficult issues and challenges.

I spent a year in his office, when it should only have been six months, because he was engaged on major project for a shipping magnate called Sir John Reeves Ellerman and he needed the same assistant to work with him all through the project, which eventually led to the creation of a major charity, now called the John Ellerman Foundation (and many other things).

After a year in other departments, I qualified and went on to be a corporate lawyer, but fate brought us back together in 1973, when Sir John Ellerman unexpectedly died and I then worked with him for another 3 years until the bulk of his extremely complex estate was wound up. By that time, he had trained me to be a tax and pensions lawyer, and that was my calling for the rest of my career. In 1981, John took relatively early retirement and I succeeded him as head of the firm's tax department.

By this time, we were firm friends and remained in contact for the rest of his life. He had bought a magnificent house on the sea front at Walmer, near Deal, Kent, quite close to Walmer Castle. He sold up in London and moved down there full time. He was a typical bachelor and did not much like looking after himself. He took over the services of a lady called Mauricia who had worked for his mother. She came from St Lucia in the Caribbean and was probably the only black person in Walmer in those days. She was devoted to John and went on working for him till he died. He was also devoted to her and sent her off on Cordon Bleu cookery classes and the like, so she became an excellent European cook as well as being an excellent West Indian one. As luck would have it (if that's the right expression), Mauricia's daughter's marriage broke down and she went off to America leaving her son for Mauricia to look after. So this little black kid from South London was transported to Walmer and John paid for him to

go to Brighton College and generally took charge of his education. He was definitely the only black child at that school, but he settled in very well as he was very tall and an excellent fast bowler (at cricket)!

A few days ago, I was put back in touch with this young man, now 36 and with a wife and 3 kids, and I started thinking about John and his exceptional family history. In the meantime, I had taken up genealogy (following my own retirement) and suddenly thought that I could do what John had only dreamed of doing in less technical days and try to reconstruct his family history, both out of my own interest and also to give something to this young man, who had learned to regard John as his third grandfather (and the only one he really knew).



James Eustace

James Eustace, great-great grandfather of John Evan Hardy Eustace married Elizabeth Eustace of Ardristan, County Carlow) in 1803. Elizabeth was a daughter of Hardy Eustace & Susana Franks of Kilbal-lyhue, County Carlow. James Eustace died in 1831.

Who Was Who: John Evan Hardy Saywell (formerly John Evan Hardy Eustace)

John Evan Hardy Saywell (formerly John Evan Hardy Eustace) was born at Sydney, Australia on 7 March 1922 and raised there. His parents divorced when he was very young and his mother remarried Thomas Stanley Saywell in 1933. John assumed the surname of his stepfather.

John had deep respect for his stepfather who raised him and helped him become educated at Cranbrook School in Sydney and in Switzerland. John served with the Australian Imperial Force in the Australian army during World War II.

He came to England after the war and was admitted to Lincoln's Inn where he was a pupil barrister from 28 September 1948. He is described in the Inn's Admissions as, "of 12 Macleay Street, Potts Point, Sydney, New South Wales (26), son of Thomas Stanley Saywell of 11C Castlereagh Street, Sydney, New South Wales, solicitor." He was called to the bar (i.e. qualified) on 18 April 1951 and practised in different chambers in Lincoln's Inn from then until 1957, when he was voluntarily disbarred so that he could re-qualify as a solicitor. The 1952 Law List shows that J.E. Saywell joined chambers at 6 New Court, Carey Street, and was a participant in the Legal Aid Scheme, between 1953 and 1955. He was at 5 New Square, London and an address at 20 Hackinsley in Liverpool is also given.



The Honourable Society of Lincoln's Inn is one of four Inns of Court in London to which barristers of England and Wales belong and where they are called to the Bar.



John Evan Saywell formerly Eustace owned a magnificent house on the sea front at Walmer, near Deal, Kent, quite close to Walmer Castle. John Saywell died at his home at Walmer on 30th March 1995.

The Law List for 1956 to 1958 gives his working address as the De Havilland Aircraft Company Limited, Hatfield, Hertfordshire.

He was admitted to the Roll of Solicitors in July 1958 and joined Layton & Co at 3-5 Wardrobe Place near St Paul's Cathedral in the City of London. In 1964, he moved to another London law firm, Nicholson, Graham & Jones at 19-21 Moorgate, near the Bank of England, and was the leading tax partner there until 1981 when he took a relatively early retirement and was succeeded as head of the firm's tax department by Michael Jacobs who is the author of the article on page 7.

Hardy Theodore Eustace (1886-1963)

John Evan Saywell's natural father was Hardy Theodore Eustace (1886-1963), son of Hardy Eustace (1843-1895) and Harriette Frazer, daughter of William Frazer of Ballyshannon, County Donegal.

John Saywell's mother, Edith Marion Evans, was the daughter of George Evans of Sydney, New South Wales. She married Hardy Theodore Eustace on 2 January 1920 in Sydney. The marriage was dissolved by divorce before 1933.

Hardy Theodore Eustace fought in the First World War gaining the rank of Captain in the service of the Royal Australian Engineers, Australian Imperial Force. He was with the Queensland State Railways Engineers Department and later General Manager of the Ford Motor Company in Queensland. Hardy Theodore Eustace married (2) Ellen, daughter of William Hart of Brisbane on 13 April 1939.

Hardy Theodore Eustace died at Brisbane, Australia on 5 August 1963.

Ballon, County Carlow Roman Catholic Chapel Ruins and cemetery

Ballon (Irish: *Ballán*) is a village in County Carlow, Ireland. It is located on the N80 road near Carlow. The main attraction and meeting point is the 'Bull-Tree' on the corner of main street and Ballon Hill. Also on this corner is McAssey's Butcher's and store.

The village has two pubs, Joe Doyle's and Kavanagh's Lounge, both on the Main Street in the centre of the village. A Chinese take-away is situated in Chaple Street and Jimmy's Take Away is in Main Street. There are Service Stations at either end of the village.

High school athletes find thrills in Ultimate, a popular, growing sport

Jordan Barry and Max Wolk learned to play Ultimate at Jewish summer camp in Wisconsin. "Ultimate has been huge there ever since I've been there," said Barry, a senior at Hopkins (Minnesota) High School.

What is Ultimate? Ultimate is a sport played with a disc (frisbee). Points are scored by passing the disc to a teammate in the opposing end zone. Other basic rules are that players must not take steps while holding the disc (maintain a pivot), and interceptions and incomplete passes are turnovers. At peak play there is a higher cooperation within the striving competition. Rain, wind, or occasionally other adversities can make for a testing match, with rapid turnovers, heightening the pressure of play.

From its beginnings in the late '60s US counterculture, ultimate has resisted empowering any referee with rule enforcement, instead relying on the sportsmanship of players and invoking the "Spirit of the Game" to maintain fair play. Players call their own fouls and dispute a foul only when they genuinely believe it did not occur. Play without referees is the norm for league play, but has been supplanted in club competition by the use of "observers" to mediate disputes, and the nascent professional leagues even employ empowered referees.

In 2012 there were 5.1 million ultimate players in the USA. It isn't quite huge in Minnesota, but it's getting there. Minnesota, in fact, leads the nation in youth playing Ultimate, a sport invented by high school students in New Jersey in the late 1960s. Max Wolk captains the varsity and was voted MVP by teammates. There are four Ultimate -- no longer known as Ultimate Frisbee for legal reasons -- teams at Hopkins, all playing the same system. In other words, it's a program, and it draws athletes from all other sports.



"On the varsity team, we've got guys from Nordic, soccer, basketball and football," Wolk said. "Lots of skills from other sports translate to Ultimate, so we can recruit a basketball player or football player, and they can make the jump pretty easily."

Though Ultimate is not officially sanctioned by the Minnesota State High School League, its popularity continues to grow among students. The tournament began with 11 teams in 2002 in Eagan. Five years later, it moved to a few fields on the campus of St. John's University in Collegeville. This year, the tournament eclipsed 70 teams and will occupy up to 30 fields in Blaine. Hopkins will be a favorite after winning the Central Regional Championship, which featured 15 teams from six states May 17-18 in Ames, Iowa.

"Losing that game really caused us to concentrate hard and focus in practice," Wolk said. "We have a goal in mind, and we're hungry for revenge." Minnesota Youth Ultimate, a nonprofit, sponsors a spring season of eight games and the state tournament. The game, somewhat like football with a flying disc, requires seven players to a side. The only stoppage in play is after a score. Players officiate the game themselves.

According to the World Flying Disc Federation, there are more than 5 million players in the U.S., and 20 states conduct high school championships. Although still a relatively new sport, Ultimate already has some Minnesota powerhouses.

We've been growing our tournament with the intention of bringing Ultimate to as many youth players as we can," said Bruce Mebust, chair of state tournament sponsor Minnesota Youth Ultimate. But, Mebust said, the tournament is about more than crowning a champion. "They're here to join in the joy of playing the game," he said. "We're not just winning games. We're building a community."

"It's a good community. When people get introduced to it and see it, a lot of them love it and then bring it to their own community." Max Wolk

FOUR local veterans of the Burma Star campaign, all now in their nineties, donned their berets and medals last Friday to take part in the annual VJ Day service at Gloucester War Memorial.

Norman Auld, Fred Eustace, James Leach and Ron Harding all took part in the campaign and are four of just eight remaining survivors in Gloucester.

At a ceremony supported by The Royal Naval Association, the Royal British Legion and families of past veterans, the four stood proudly at the memorial during the service.

Wreaths were laid by Mr Leach, along with city MP Richard Graham and Gloucester Mayor Debbie Llewelyn.

Peggy Goode, who has taken over as secretary of the Burma Star Association, following the death of her husband Fred since last year's VJ

Day, said she wants to ensure veterans are always remembered for generations to come.

"I have Fred upstairs looking down - he would want me to be here on his behalf," she said.

"I will be here every year to remember those that gave their lives for ours. We are very lucky they were so brave."

Local BSA chaplain The Reverend Marilyn Sharland talked in her sermon of the 'forgotten army' and said: "We must always remember to thank those who fought on our behalf to give us tomorrow - they aren't here today."

Mr Graham, who is a great supporter of the BMA, said: "Obviously the number of Burma Star Association members is getting smaller so all the more reason to honour the memories of those like my uncle, who fought in Burma."

"This day is not only a public duty, it is a personal responsibility. This year marks 69 years since Japan surrendered, effectively ending the Second World War."

Frederick Eustace was called up for duty on 2 December 1940. The fact that he only had one eye didn't count. He went to Harrington Barracks, Liverpool and did 8 weeks training. He was released from active duty in March 1947 spent more than 6 years in the British military.

From Harrington Barracks Fred Eustace joined the Cheshire Regiment and given his army number 14373119. On arriving he was told that anyone who had any medical experience or wanted to do Red Cross work or St John's Ambulance work could volunteer.

Fred Eustace did volunteer and was posted to medical school in Aldershot, Crookham. There he did 12 weeks at Aldershot of which 8 weeks was square bashing under the command of Grenadier Guards Sergeants. This was followed by training in the medical school.

On completion of this training in 1942 he was posted to a Field Ambulance at Catterick, Yorkshire, in the Lake District where they were joined up with the Black Watch for mountain training all around Spean Bridge and Ben Nevis.

Fred Eustace's Military Career

After having been up Ben Nevis during his training he developed pneumonia and went into hospital in Alvestone in Lancashire. While there his unit was posted to Norway to take the Luffeton Islands - only 7 came back.

After coming out of hospital, during 7 days leave, he was posted to India. He landed at Bombay, then we went to Dilally (that's another big military place where you got equipped). Then you were posted to units up the line. The Japanese had taken Singapore in 1942, the British were retreating and retreated back to the Indian Border. He did not come home then until 1946. At the end of the war he was in Koema, Imfal, Chitagong because he was with a mobile hospital unit. He would work with whatever different regiments were in the area.

At this time he was with the King's own Scottish Borderers, Highland Fusiliers, The First Gloucesters, The Cheshires. He covered whichever armies were fighting in those areas.

The Japanese war ended 15 September 1945, however, he remained in the jungle between Kohima and Imfal and had a hospital which was permanently based in Kohima. He then moved on to Rangoon and then to Siam. Although the war had finished there remained all the prisoner of war camps to be emptied. He accepted the offer of a months leave if he stayed on for another 2 years to assist with emptying these camps.

The plan was to marry my mother, Winifred Hanman while on leave. All approvals being given, Dad took his months leave and went home leaving Siam in November 1945 travelling by air in Liberator bombers. He was hoping to be home before Christmas but there were riots in Calcutta and he ended up staying in prisoner camps himself and then spent Christmas in Bethlehem, Jerusalem. Dad eventually arrived in England on 8 January 1946. Mum had been making all the wedding arrangements without knowing exactly when Dad was coming home. All she knew is that he was in transit.

Frederick and Winifred had to go to the Bishop of Gloucester to get a special Licence and got married in St. Aldate Church, Finlay Road, Gloucester on 19 January 1946. The wedding reception was at a Berni Restaurant in Kings Square, Gloucester

Although mum and dad were married he still had another two years service to do. He returned to his unit in Siam to help clearing all the army camps and left on 8 February 1946 after a 3 day honeymoon in London.

He took off from Witney in a Dakota, DC3 and went via Bardoe in France; Sicily where he had 2-3 days sight seeing where he saw Mount Etna; Lida near Jerusalem, El Addam Cairo where he had engine trouble - he went to Cairo until they fixed the plane, he ended up having a holiday for about 4 weeks; Persia; Iraq; Iran; and then into Moripoor in the bottom end of India; he would spend a few days at each stop and it took about 6 months to get back to his unit at Tulalemcorn Hospital Bangkok, Siam where he was a nurse in the operating theatre (nursing Orderly Class I Theatre on his pay slip). By the time he got back to his unit he only had about 12 months there and was sent back home. He returned home by sea on the Eastern Prince from Singapore, having got to Singapore by train from Bangkok and passed through the Suez Canal to arrive in Gourock, Glasgow, in Scotland. Having finally returned home in March 1947 he was on permanent leave until he was released.

IF GARDENS COULD SPEAK (Part I)

By George Colin Eustace

This is a story of a Eustace family, an ordinary family; a family of achievements, legend and remembrances. It is also a family which has suffered heartache and hardship and these notes will hopefully serve as a testament to these things and provide a contextual template for future generations to build on.

The H4 mentioned in the title wants some explanation. My Grandmother, Frances Eustace (née Weston, 1876 – 1957) purchased a plot of land in the Gardens of Remembrance at Stoke Poges, Buckinghamshire, England in June 1944. The plot number is H4 and it cost her £200, which constituted half a year's salary in those days. Her youngest son John died of tuberculosis on 6th October 1944, and we know his impending death triggered the purchase.

The memorial gardens cover nine hectares adjacent to Stoke Park. They are a cemetery for cremation burials only. The gardens were laid out to an innovative design, having none of the traditional buildings or memorials associated with funerary sites. Features include ponds, formal and informal gardens, fountains, knot gardens, a central parterre and tree avenues. In 1928 Sir Noel Mobbs gave a piece of gently sloping open parkland for a garden of remembrance. The garden was laid out by Edward White of Milner, Son and White, Landscape Architects, during the early 1930s. The layout was completed in November 1937. The site remains in use as a garden of remembrance.

To my father's generation, my grandfather, George Philip Eustace was always known as 'Father'. He was a pillar of the Nonconformist Church at Gunnersbury, near Chiswick in West London, United Kingdom.

He was teetotal until one Christmas when he asked for an orange juice and he got one laced with gin. Having tasted it he said to his son, my father, "Frank, this is very good orange juice!" We never dared do it again!

On his weekend visits to my parents' home, 'Levendale', 8 Ladymead, Guildford, Surrey, he would attend various churches. One weekend, he visited the Friends Meeting House, a place of worship of the Religious Society of Friends (Quakers). He was asked as he entered the room if he had a letter and, as he did not have one, he was asked to sit behind a barrier.

There was only one other person sitting behind this barrier, and Grandpa thought that they may have been placed there in disgrace. When my father later asked him what he had thought of the service, my grandfather replied that he did not think, if Jesus had attended the service, he would have had a letter!

Having married Frances Weston in 1901, George Philip Eustace lived through three Wars, five monarchs, had three sons and three grandchildren. He relaxed by reading library books, but always kept them tucked in a leather cover, so we never knew what sort of books he liked. He rigged up a torch in his brief case so he was able to read in the train during the 'black out' during the War.

As a young boy I picture him cleaning the steel knives on an emery board in the kitchen on a Friday night; there was little stainless steel in those days. My other memories include his tin of sweets which had a padlock on the lid, hearing how he put out an incendiary bomb in the street outside their house in Ridgeway Road, in Osterley, Middlesex during World War II, and sleeping in his Anderson Shelter on my visits to my grandparents' house.

He retired in 1950 and he and my grandmother moved to 'Levendale' to live with my parents, but he died just three weeks later. My father always said that 'Father' had wanted to die to answer the question of whether there was or wasn't the existence of an afterlife. When clearing out my mother's flat in 2002 we came across a font presented by Gunnersbury Church (where I was christened) in memory of my grandfather. The inscription reads, "George Eustace 1872- 1950, Deacon 1897 – 1950. "He did part of his duty." We are not sure where this inscription is from, but it is not to be found in the Bible.

When my parents and I visited this church when I was a boy, I was sometimes asked to pump the organ by hand. My cousin Peter Eustace took on this role after me. The organ was played by my other cousin, Eustace Escott and both he and his piano will be featured later in this story. I am pleased to say that they did eventually fit an electric pump on the organ!

Frances Eustace (née Weston, 1876 – 1957)

Nanny Fan' had three sisters and an elder brother. Her father was a leather merchant in London and, in fact, Nanny Fan was born within the sound of Bow bells and always claimed she was a Cockney. Her youngest sister Kitty lived a long life, reaching her 100th birthday in the 1970's. After receiving a telegram from the Queen at her birthday party, a local reporter asked Kitty how she felt being one hundred years old and she replied, "Like always with my hands!"

To me Auntie Kitty was my 'Giddy Aunt', full of fun after a very hard life on the Canadian Prairies. They returned to England in 1937 and my mother and her father helped her daughter, Kath, a great deal after her husband, Dick O'Mahony, died as a relatively young man. In fact my wife, Elaine, and I had Kath to live with us for a number of years towards the end of her life because she had no direct family of her own. Sadly, for the seven years before she died, Kath lived in a residential home in Peterborough, suffering from dementia but I am sure she did not know where she was.

I was six in 1937 and I remember being taken at five in the morning by car to Southampton to meet the liner that brought Auntie Kitty and her husband, Walter Gray, back from Canada. All Auntie Kitty could say was, "Oh boy! Oh boy!" She certainly wanted to come home to England after some thirty arduous years in Canada. I can picture Uncle Walter carrying his fishing rods as we walked around the decks. I think we had lunch on board, but I am not sure on this point.

Frances's brother, James Weston, had two sons, Frank and William, and five grandchildren. These cousins were all older than me but I often visited them with my parents at their homes in Iver, near Slough when I was young. We nearly always had Marmite sandwiches for tea I recollect, which I did not like at all!

Frank's children, Trevor and Pauline, and William's children, Derek, Moira and Keith, maintained contact over the years, especially whilst my parents were alive, through Christmas cards and occasional parties.

I am afraid that of William's three children, Moira is the only survivor and she lives with her husband Christopher Risdale-Smith in Burpham, near Guildford in Surrey. Trevor lives in St Ives, Cornwall and Pauline in Sevenoaks, Kent.

Grandma was definitely a matriarch; a woman who was clever with her hands, making both a frog suit for me at primary school and a pigskin weekend bag when I was at boarding school. She would often say to me, "Real leather. Smell it boy."



I was very fond of Nanny Fan (Frances Eustace née Weston). Here is a photo of Nanny Fan in the garden at Levendale.

Frances and George Eustace lived at 1 Arlington Gardens, Turnham Green, Chiswick, London, and the name 'Arlington' became well known in our family because when money was tight, Frances would borrow money from her sons which she would pay it back at building society rates. When I was a young man I also borrowed money from my father and my children have also benefitted from 'Arlington' type loans!

As a young woman Frances trained as a milliner and ran a hat shop for some time. After moving in with my parents and, on the death of her husband, she spent many hours in the garden and greenhouse at 'Levendale' putting her green fingers to work. My wife Elaine and I still have the bow-fronted sideboard and bookcase she brought with her to 'Levendale', and my daughter, Claire, has her eight day chiming bracket clock.

My Eustace grandparents had three sons, George Frank born in 1902, Donald William born in 1908, and John Philip born in 1915. I will start with the youngest John.

John Philip Eustace 1915 – 1944

My uncle John Philip Eustace was the youngest son of my paternal grandparents. He was a clever young man, qualifying as a quantity surveyor and, like his mother, very good with his hands. He built a model sailing boat which, to my great joy, he gave me one Christmas and which my father and I sailed on the Round Pond in Hyde Park. There was no radio control in those days! John owned a 14 foot National racing dingy and tried to sail it along the south coast one summer holiday, but was beaten by tides off Portland Bill.

After he died I had my first sail in this boat with his brother, my other uncle, Don, and we nearly capsized.

John and Don also built a Canadian Canoe which I repaired when I was sixteen years old and, with a friend, paddled from Guildford to Twickenham. Later we were to continue our journey in Don's 18 foot National The Foggy Dew to Whitstable on the Thames Estuary. It was on the crossing from Canvey Island to Whitstable that we entered a heavy rain storm and could not see a thing. I had been taking cross bearings on the chart so we had an idea where we were and so, with compass to the fore, we sailed on. However, we heard waves and beached only to find ourselves right opposite Whitstable Yacht club. Some of the other boats ended up in Margate and had to sail back the next day. How is that for a bit of navigation, or luck!

John Philip Eustace married Molly, a nurse at the Ventnor TB hospital. After his death she had to retrain as a nurse under her maiden name because she had married an ex-patient. Molly later married a Scottish engine driver and became the District Nurse in a small village near Ayr in Scotland. They had one son and my father kept in touch with Molly right up to her death.

One snowy Christmas, John, his two brothers, and yours truly (aged about six), enjoyed being towed behind my father's car on a homemade toboggan until we were stopped by a spoilsport of a local policeman!

John's early death in 1944 from TB at the age of just twenty-nine triggered the purchase of the H4 Garden cemetery plot in Stoke Poges Gardens of Remembrance.

Donald William Eustace 1908-1993

Uncle Don Eustace and my father formed the 8th Chiswick Scout Troop which, when combined with the Roman Catholic troop, became the 8/15 Chiswick.

My father was called 'Skipper' and Don was called 'Pilot'. At many camp fires 'Pilot' would bring out 'Jimmy the One', a ventriloquist's doll dressed as a Sea Scout and, in the darkness, Don would hold very amusing conversations with Jimmy the One. Don had found the doll on a bomb site in London during the Blitz.

Don's family was very musical and his wife, Gladys, who preferred to be called Pip, played the guitar and piano and their children, Peter and Frances Mary still play instruments. At Christmas parties at 'Levendale', we had many concerts and Peter would often play a descant to the carols on his flute. Frances Mary became a professional bassoonist. After graduating from Cambridge, Peter worked in PR for BP and Cable & Wireless.

Don took part in the Normandy landings on D-Day after volunteering to man a trawler that serviced the invasion fleet at Spithead. In fact he was nearly taken across the Channel as the crew might have overheard the plans on the eve of D-Day. In fact they were forbidden to land for forty-eight hours and Don told us that whereas Spithead was full of ships the night before D-Day, it was completely empty by daylight on the actual date of the landings.

Don Eustace ran Escotts of Brixton, originally the wheelwright business founded by my paternal grandfather's brother-in-law, Jimmy Escott. When Escotts was closed down and the land sold, my cousin Peter and I benefitted from the Trust fund that had supported Jimmy's blind son, Eustace Escot, throughout his life.

Jimmy Escott was an orphan who made good. He was a strong influence on me because each birthday and Christmas he would give me three or four classical music records which, I believe to this day, opened my ears to the classics. Eustace had a Bechstein piano which was given to my father's church (Guildford United Reformed Church, Portsmouth Road, Guildford) when Eustace had to go into residential care. Promoted by Peter and Jean Burge, the piano would later be refurbished via a legacy from my mother's estate, plus a large legacy from another family, and unveiled on 29th October 2006. All my immediate family were at the rededication service, and I know my mother would be pleased to think she had helped the church to maintain this strong musical tradition.

Don also had a major influence on my life, arranging for me to stay with a French family after the Scout Jamboree in 1947. Despite failing in French at school, this visit gave me enough basic French to survive a twenty minute interview (in French) with the Vice President (Technical) of the cosmetic company, L'Oréal, a few years later and to get the job!

My uncle also gave me the opportunity to crew his 18 foot National sailing dingy on many occasions and we participated in the National championship. I am afraid that being river people from Twickenham, we could not compete with the sea sailors of Whitstable and came well down the fleet, both at Burnham and Chichester regattas.

I repaired the Kelpie, a 12 foot lug sail dingy for Don and it was this boat which gave Pip's nephew, Tony Hatch, the inspiration to write "Mucking about on the River", a hit song in the fifties.

Don's son, Peter, has moved well up the scale in yachting, having sailed in the Fastnet Race and owning a 36 foot ocean going sailing yacht. Peter has even sailed to the Azores and back, but he did say, "Never again!" He is currently trying to qualify for the Fastnet race with his son, John.

I met Don's first wife, Felix, at the Scout Jamboree in 1947. They had been separated on refugee duties after the war when they both ran camps for the refugees in Europe for the Boy Scout organisation. They later divorced.

He met his second wife, Gladys 'Pip' at a party where she sang the song, "The Foggy Dew". They were married soon after and named their 18 foot National the "Foggy Dew", see photo at right. After Don's death, Pip continued to live in Staveley Road in Chiswick until 2004 when she moved to Suffolk. She died on 11th December 2004.

At my 70th birthday party, Pip reminded us all that her sister-in-law, my mother, always warned her not to go out with Don in the car without taking a can of petrol as he was very prone to running out of fuel. Indeed, I spent a journey or two on buses looking for garages when out with my Uncle Don!

Gladys 'Pip' Eustace

1917 – 2004

Pip was born Gladys Marie Chapman and grew up in Deptford, the third daughter of Sidney & Florence (née Kemp). The 'Chapman girls' were Florence, Eileen (mother of Tony Hatch), Gladys and Vera. Sidney Chapman was a butcher and had his own shop. He also opened a shop for his son but this was not a success, at least to start with, and for a few years during her childhood things were pretty tough. As a result, Pip used to spend her school holidays in Cornwall where she had relatives, the Tonkins, on her mother's side.

Pip was briefly married before the war, her first married name being Weekley. She qualified as a teacher after the war, moving to Chiswick to teach first at Belmont Junior School, then at Strand on the Green. It was while she was there that she met Don having been introduced as someone who might be interested in becoming a Lady Cubmaster via their mutual friends the Hawkeys.

The name Pip came about because she gave everyone the pip and the name stuck, with her preferring it to her legal name and, presumably, to the nickname, 'Mickey' which she had earned during her days at teacher training college because of her irrepressible optimism, like Mr Micawber!

Eustace Families of Gowerhass, County Clare



The Gowerhass Eustace family home since the 1820's.

The townland of Gowerhass is southwest of Kilmihil. Members of this Gowerhass Eustace clan lived predominately in the Parish of Kilrush. The Freeholder List records of the early 1800s do not include this family. The Gowerhass Eustace families appear to be more closely connected to the Robert Eustace (born 1815) family from Cahermurphy.

Irish naming patterns and oral history have been used to help determine which Eustace families claim the townland of Gowerhass and its surrounds as home.

The Eustace families of Gowerhass featured in this issue are as follow:

- 1) Simon and Bridget McNamara Eustace, Sr.** whose son Simon married **Bridget Crotty**. Their descendants (until recently) owned the original Gowerhass property that was first recorded in the 1826 Tithe Applotment;
- 2) John Eustace** (*Simon Sr.'s son*), was a farmer and pensioner, who married **Ellen Reidy** in Kilmihil and eventually made Leitrim his home.
- 3) John Eustace**, a cooper, who married **Margaret Price** in 1867 at Kilmihil and whose son Patrick was a tailor in Kilrush. John's mother was widowed at an early age and lived in Kiltumper. This Eustace family eventually lived in Cooraclare and today, some members still reside in Clare.
- 4) Michael Eustace** who married **Honor Lynch** and immigrated to San Pedro, Buenos Aires Province, Argentina.
- 5) John and Mary O'Donnell Eustace** family from Coolmuinga who today, all live in Australia;
- 6) James and Ann McNamara Eustace** family whose children (Edward, Ann Crotty and Simon) immigrated to New York and Chicago;
- 7) Michael Eustace and Mary Downes** whose known descendants are 1) the Mary Eustice Shiely and Simon Eustice family from Minnesota US; 2) the James Eustice family from Cheboygan, Michigan; and 3) the John Eustice family from Niagara, New York.
- 8) Mary Eustace** married **Frank McMahon** of Tullagower and whose son, Simon, emigrated to Indiana.

According to James Frosts' *The History and Topography of the County of Clare*, William Smith of Tullagower, gent. states "that in 1676, Lord Clare, being owner in fee of Cahermurphy and Cahermore, in consideration of £200 fine, and for the yearly rent of £25, demised these townlands to John Harwell and Giles Vandeleur for their lives. Harwell soon after parted this kingdom never minding said lands, so as that Vandeleur was forced and did pay off the fine of £200, to Lord Clare. His lordship, in 1678, mortgaged these lands, with others, to Alderman Wm. Yorke of Limerick, for £1,200. In 1681, Smith purchased for £300 Vandeleur's interest, and then got from Lord Clare a new lease for three lives, Henry Hickman being appointed his lordship's attorney to deliver possession. The lease and livery of seizin were witnessed by Owen M'Sweeney, Thomas Power, Jas. Fitzgerald, Jas. M'Donnell, Darby Considine, and Hugh Hickman. Conformably with the terms of his lease, the claimant made great improvements in his chief residence at Gowerhass."

Smith in another petition states "that Tullygower and Gowerhass were formerly held from Lord Clare by old George Roche, and by his son James Roche. In 1671 James Roche sold to petitioner his title in these lands. Then Lord Clare made a new lease to Smith, at the yearly rent of £40, for the lives of William, son of Walter Hickman of Doonagurroge, and of Richard Bernard of Cork. By the terms of the lease, the tenant was to enclose and plant with apple trees two acres of land, and to build a house 50 feet long, with a thatched roof. The lease was witnessed by John Hart, Roland Wall, Morogh Kelly, Teige Glasson, Edmd. Gerald, Dermot Glasson, and one Halpin. Petitioner adds that he greatly improved the premises, making Gowerhass his principal residence."

GOWERHASS EUSTACE FAMILIES

SOME DESCENDANTS OF JOHN EUSTACE (1746-1823)

Irish Naming Patterns:

The Irish were very traditional in their naming patterns; fathers frequently named their first sons after their fathers. The second son was usually named after the mother's father, etc. This Irish naming practice (although not always true) can generally identify which family a person belonged. This Irish naming practice although, not infallible, generally identified which family a person may belong to. The name "Simon" is of special importance in this branch of the Clare Eustace family. For example, records for over ten men named "Simon" have been discovered in the Gowerhass related Eustace family trees. The name Simon seldom appears in any other Irish Eustace family.

To have ten Gowerhass Eustace families name their son "Simon" means that Simon was an important man in this family's history. Simon or Simon's sons, or possibly Simon's brother, John, may have been the original leaseholder(s) in Gowerhass. The largest Eustace leaseholder in Gowerhass in 1826 was John Eustace. Leasing land next to him were Simon and Patrick Eustace.

We do know from cemetery records in Old St. Michael's cemetery in Kilmihil that Simon Eustace and his brother, John, erected their father John's headstone in 1823.

Along with Simon, the names Walter, Robert, James and Edward follow descendants from this Gowerhass clan. These descendants not only include the Gowerhass family who until recently were living on the original homestead, the John Eustace family from Kiltumper/Cooraclare and Argentina, the Thomas Eustace family whose descendants immigrated to Australia, but also the Robert Eustace family who in the 1800's lived on land in Cahermurphy.

Because the naming traditions were so strong in the 1800's, this is a strong indication of relationship of the Gowerhass clan to John and Edmund Eustace from the Cahermurphy (Robert Eustace) family, and of course, Walter Eustace who is found living next to Robert in the 1855 Griffith's Valuation record and who died in Cahermurphy in 1881.

These families' descendants appear to include the Oil City, Pennsylvania Eustace family, the Cheboygan, Michigan Eustace family, the Mary Eustice Shiely family from Minnesota, the Simon Eustice family from Minnesota, The Simon McMahon family in Indiana and the James and Ann McNamara Eustace family who settled in New York and Chicago, Illinois.

Oral history also plays a part in determining these connections. According to the late Sally Eustice from Cheboygan, Michigan, the Oil City Eustace families were referred to as "cousins" and Bernard Eustace of Moyasta, Kilrush, County Clare (a Gowerhass Eustace) from Cooraclare remembered the following as a child: "Tom Eustace [Robert Eustace, Jr.'s son] was from Cahermurphy. [He] came to our house in Cooraclare on horseback."

Bernard Eustace's family was also friendly with John and Ellen Thompson Eustace's family from Kilmaley. Ellen's mother was Ellen Eustace. She was a Gowerhass Eustace and likely, the sister to Bernard's great grandfather. This suggests more than a casual link between the Eustaces of Gowerhass and Kilmaley.

Simon Eustace & Bridget McNamara

Descendants of a John Eustace (1746-1823) claim Gowerhass, Kilrush as their homeland in County Clare. The citation for John Eustace's life/death is found at www.clarelibrary.ie where in the St. Michael's Old Church Graveyard Transcriptions 1731-1988, Kilmihil, there is a listing of a headstone with the following inscription:

Patrick learned his trade at Cannock's in Limerick and later purchased the old Church of Ireland School in Kilrush from Admiral Vandeleur for £600. In 1995, the property was owned by the J.J. Clancy Hardware. This Eustace family eventually lived in Cooraclare and today, some members still reside in Clare.

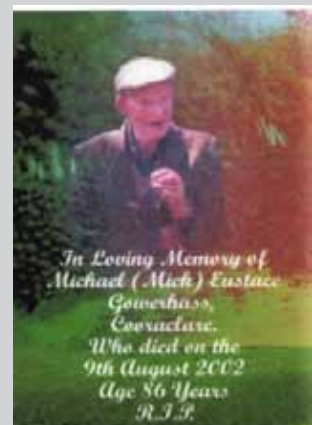

ii. Thomas Eustace was born on 5 Dec 1860 in Coolmuinga, Kilrush, County Clare and died on 19 Oct 1930 in Bulimba, Queensland, Australia.

iii. Bridget Eustace was born on 31 Jan 1863 Coolmuinga, Kilrush, County Clare. She died on 22 Dec 1932 in Brisbane, Queensland, Australia. Bridget and her brother Thomas Eustace 5 Dec 1860 arrived on the Goalpara 1 Jan 1884. Thomas died 19 Oct 1930 Brisbane. She married William Deel in Brisbane. She died 22 Dec 1932 Brisbane.

iv. Maria (Mary) Eustace was born in 1865 in Coolmuinga, Kilrush, County Clare. She died on 27 Jan 1946 in Orleigh Terrace, West End, Brisbane, Queensland, Australia. Mary married Neil Anton Anderson on 17th November, 1888 at St. Stephens Cathedral, Brisbane. Witnesses were W. Deel and Jane Fitzpatrick. They had a dairy farm at Ryan St., West End, Brisbane. Mary and Neil had two sons and one daughter.

v. Patrick Eustace was born on 31 Oct 1866 in Kilrush, County Clare. He died on 14 Jun 1931 in Townsville, Queensland, Australia. Patrick never married and worked in Townsville for the railway as a laborer. His baptismal record was transcribed by the Clare Heritage Centre from St. Senan's, Kilrush, church records and it stated he was baptized in 1866. However, Patrick's actual birth year from his emigration record and his age at the time of his father's death, was 1873.

vi. John Joseph Eustace was born on 7 Feb 1868 in Coolmuinga, Kilrush, County Clare. He died on 05 Oct 1956 in Ipswich, Queensland, Australia. John was baptized on December 22, 1868; however, his recorded birth was February 7, 1868. John Eustace immigrated to Australia in 1886.

vii. James Eustace was born on 27 May 1871 in Coolmuinga, Kilrush, County Clare. He died on 29 Jan 1905 in Knockerra, Kilrush, County Clare. James' GRO birth record is May 27, 1871; however, his baptismal record is April 28, 1871.

viii. Margaret Eustace was born on 3 August 1875 in Coolmuinga, Kilrush, County Clare. In 1903 Margaret and Ellen Eustace were living and working at the Railway Hotel, Flinders St. Townsville as domestic servants.

Margaret Eustace and probably her sister Ellen arrived on the ship Duke of Westminster. Margaret died on 1 Jun 1951 in Townsville, Queensland, Australia. The GRO

birth record states Margaret was born on August 3, 1875; however, her baptismal record is July 27, 1875. Margaret married Phillip Edward Brady, an iron monger by trade on April 18, 1910. Phillip Edward Brady was born 6 Aug 1872 in Brisbane and died in 1953. His parents were Phillip Brady and Sarah Ann Murphy.

ix. Ellen Mary Eustace was born on 2 June 1877 in Coolmuinga, Kilrush and died on 12 Dec 1960 in Townsville, Queensland, Australia. The GRO record of birth states June 2, 1877; the baptismal record states June 3, 1877. Ellen married John "Jackie" Peace. Ellen and Jackie had butcher shops in West End and Townsville.

x. Anne Eustace was born on 21 Jul 1878 in Kilrush, County Clare. She died after 1918 in Queensland, Australia. Anne's baptism was transcribed from St. Senan's records by the Clare Heritage Centre. From all other records including her emigration and her age at the time of her father's death, Anne was actually born in 1878. She emigrated with her brother Patrick from Ireland to Australia in 1899.

xi. Honora Cecilia Eustace was born on 28 July 1878, in Coolmuinga, Kilrush, County Clare. She died Feb 1965 in Townsville, Queensland, Australia. St. Senan's baptismal record is July 29, 1878 and GRO record is July 28, 1878. Nora married John Douglas, a railway employee. They lived on Charters Towers Road, Townsville.

xii. Catherine Eustace was born on 14 Apr 1882 in Coolmuinga, Kilrush, County Clare. She died on 1 June 1938 in Townsville, Queensland, Australia. GRO Record is April 14, 1882 and St. Senan's baptismal record is April 20, 1882. Catherine married Robert Colin. They had a small shop on Phillip St., Hermit Park, Townsville.

xiii. Michael Eustace was born on 20 Jun 1884 in Coolmuinga, Kilrush, County Clare. He died on 3 Jan 1908 in Coolmuinga, Kilrush, County Clare. St. Senan's baptismal record is April 18, 1884. GRO record is June 20, 1884. Thomas and Mary Leonard Eustace's other son James Eustace married Ann McNamara and their children (Edward, Ann Crotty and Simon) immigrated to New York and Chicago;

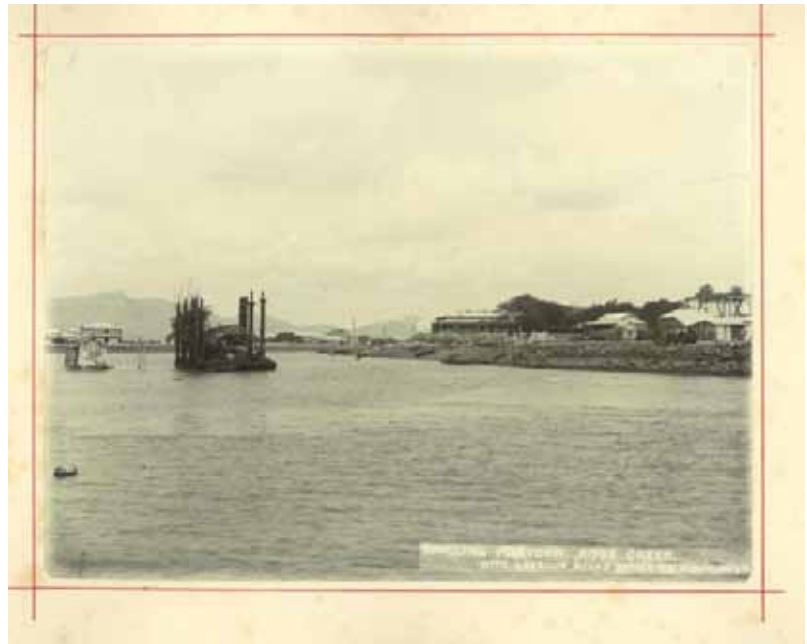
3) Thomas Eustace married Mary Leonard. Their children included John and James Eustace. Their son John Eustace married Mary O'Donnell. Born about 1838, John Eustace was a farmer in Coolmuinga, County Clare. At the age of 25, he married Mary O'Donnell at Knockerra in about 1858. Mary O'Donnell is the daughter of Simon O'Donnell. She was born 1842 in Clare, Ireland. She died on 02 Oct 1902 in Coolmuinga, Kilrush, Clare. The Eustace family lived on a small Coolmuinga farm. The family of thirteen slept in the loft under the thatched roof; the loft was only accessible by a stepladder.

John Eustace emigrated from Coolmuinga after the death of his wife, Mary. He arrived in Brisbane, Queensland, Australia on January 1, 1912 on the ship Waipara which departed from London, England. His birth year is about 1842 according to the ship record:

John Eustace was retired and lived at the Shamrock Hotel in 1913. His daughter and son-in-law, Nora Cecilia Douglas and John Douglas, a grocer, lived at the Shamrock at this time. John Eustace remained in Townsville with a number of his adult children until his death on October 15, 1918 at the Shamrock Hotel, Palmer Street, Townsville.

Nine years elapsed between the closure of the first Shamrock Hotel in Townsville and the opening of the second hotel of that name in 1889. Architects W.G. Smith & Son designed the building, and then built by W.G. Elliott, for the first owner Michael McKee. The original hotel was a unique combination of brick at ground level with a timber superstructure. No other building, in this style, has been identified in North Queensland. The upper floor was shaded by a balcony with cast-iron balustrading and valancing.



John Eustace of Coolmuinga, Clare died October 15, 1918 and is buried in Townsville Pioneer's Cemetery located on Church Street, West End, Townsville, Australia. John Eustace's son Patrick who died in 1931 is buried in the same plot.

Darra is an older Brisbane suburb located about 14 kilometres southwest of Brisbane's central business district. It is known for its high migrant population. The first subdivisions in the area occurred in 1864. Today there are many Vietnamese, Samoan, Filipinos, Italians and of course Australians.

The houses are mainly of the Queenslander style built in the 1940s and 1950s. The majority of blocks in Darra are large enough to be subdivided, which is becoming popular in the suburb, hence making room for more modern homes. In the last few years, a property developer bought a vast tract of vacant, government land. As a result, there are now many new homes and townhouses built in Darra, which has increased its population and its geographical boundaries.

A piece of sheet music of the song "Darra", published in 1922 by R.G. Oates Estates to promote the then semi-rural lifestyle of the district.

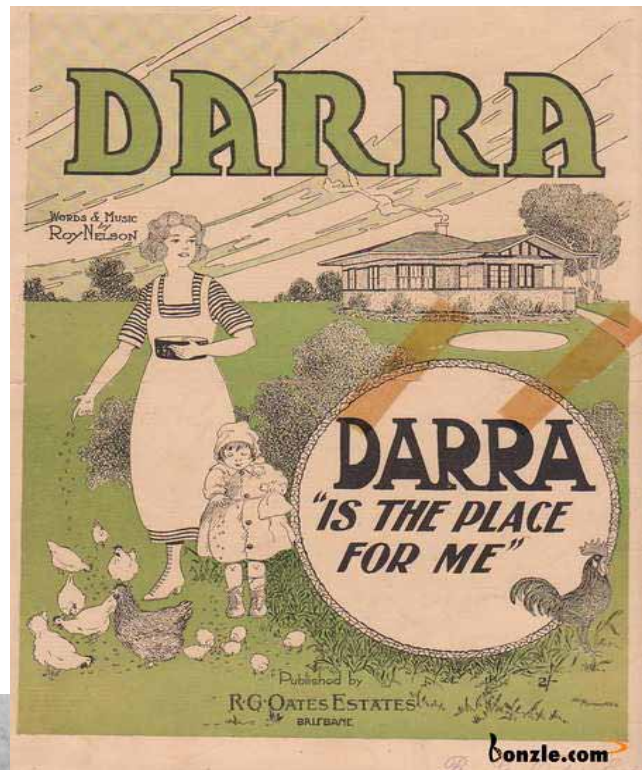

4) Michael Eustace married Mary Downes and rented land in Knockerry East and Knocknahooan, Clare. Their descendants include the Mary Eustice Shiely family and Simon Eustice family from Minnesota, the James Eustice family from Cheboygan, MI and the John Eustice family from Niagara, NY. Michael and Mary Downes Eustace's children appear to have all immigrated to Canada and the US between 1843 and 1852. Descendants include the families of: John Eustice who died in Ontario Canada before 1870 and whose family is found in US Federal Census records living in Niagara, NY; James Eustice whose descendants lived in Corry, Union, and Tiona PA and Cheboygan, MI; and Mary Eustice Shiely and Simon Eustice whose families settled in St. Paul and Minneapolis, MN after their immigration to Washington Lake, Sibley County, MN, Descendants of Michael and Mary Downes Eustace's sons Patrick and Thomas have not been located as yet.

5) Mary Eustace married Frank McMahon of Tullagower. Their children included Mary McMahon and Simon McMahon. Simon immigrated to Indiana.

Note: The Tithe Applotment Books (TAB) were compiled between 1823 and 1837 in order to establish the amount landholders should pay towards the upkeep of the Church of Ireland. Let's remember that nearly all Clare Eustaces were Roman Catholic and obliged to pay a tax to a church to which they did not belong. The taxable land in each parish was surveyed, giving the names of the occupiers of land in each townland, the acreage and class of land they held, and the amount of taxes (tithes) they were liable for. The original manuscript books are held in the National Archives in Dublin. The Tithe Applotment Books are an important pre-Famine source for family history and landholding patterns, but do not give information on the landless or those living in settlements. They also document the pre-Ordnance Survey townland names, many of which have now disappeared

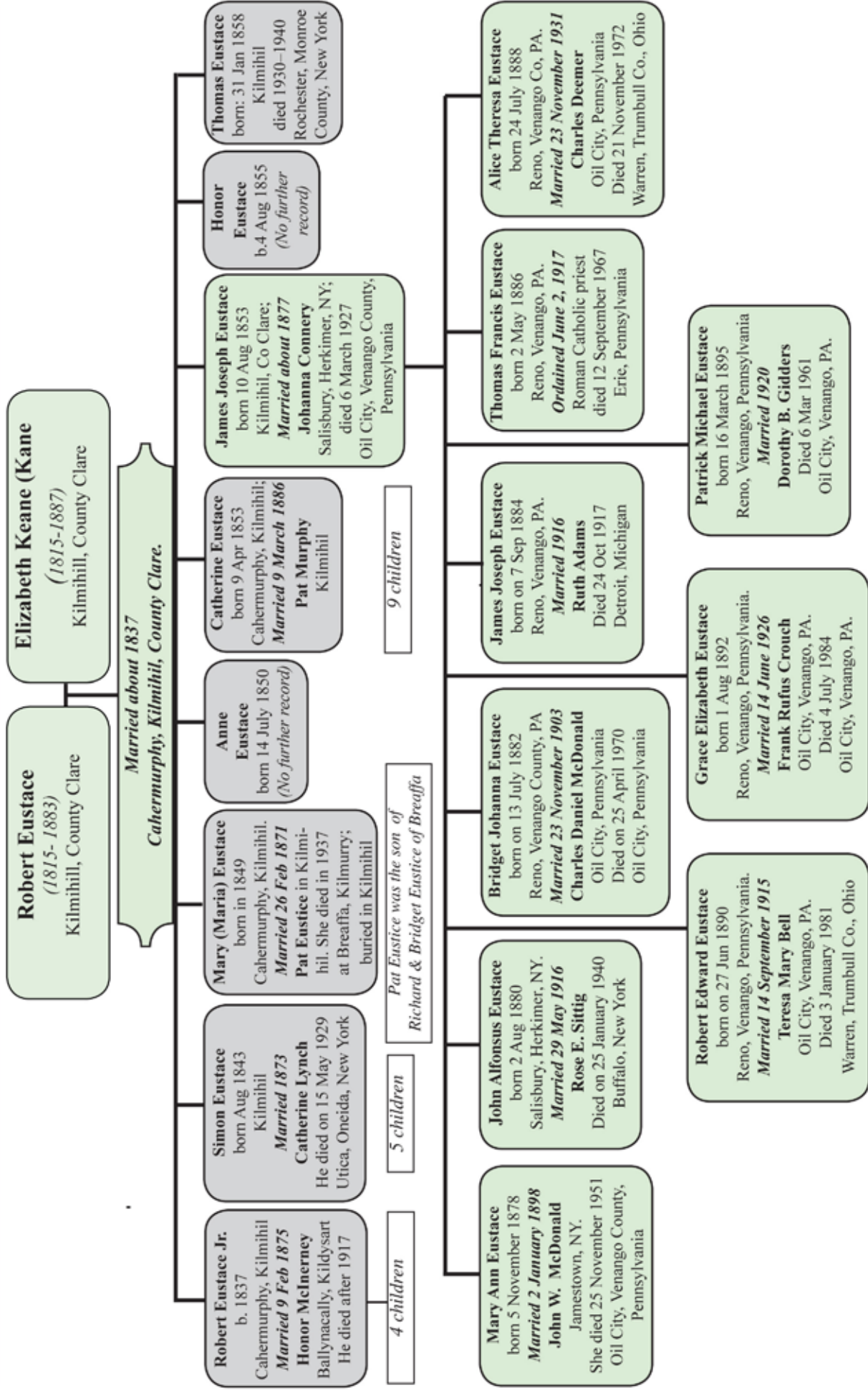

Therefore, Joe Eustace is also the great-grandson of Robert and Elizabeth (Keane) Eustace and Joe is directly related to the Eustace family from Oil City, PA. Joe's ancestry shows how interconnected the Eustace families of Clare were.

The Eustace families of County Clare have been unsure how each branch may or may not be related. It's easy to say "Oh, we are not related to this group or that group."

Y-chromosome DNA testing has clearly determined that all members of the Clare family are exact or near matches with each other from which we can conclude that they descend from the five Eustaces from Confey who lost their valuable land in Kildare and were forcibly transplanted to Clare more than 350 years ago. Also interesting is that the DNA profiles of Clare Eustaces closely match other Eustace lines with roots in Carlow, Dublin, Kildare, Longford, Offaly, and Wicklow.

Father Thomas F. Eustace

Born: 2 May 1886, Reno, Sugarcreek Township, Venango County, Pennsylvania. Died: 12 September 1967 in Erie, Pennsylvania. He was ordained a Roman Catholic Priest on June 2, 1917. Father Thomas Eustace was the son of James Joseph Eustace, a native of Kilmihill, County Clare and Johanna Connery.

Thomas F. Eustace was born in Reno, Sugarcreek Township, Venango County, Pennsylvania on May 2, 1886. He attended Reno Public Elementary School, St. Joseph's Catholic School in Oil City and graduated from St. Bonaventure College in 1914.

While in college he worked briefly as a brakeman on the railroad. On one point in his railroad career as he was enroute from Oil City to Oleas in 1911, the entire crew was composed of Eustace brothers; J.A. Eustace, conductor, James Eustace, flagman and Thomas Eustace (later Father Tom), as brakeman. The engine crew as Father Tom recalled later in life included a "couple of other fellows."

Thomas Eustace was ordained a Roman Catholic Priest at St. Bonaventure College on June 2, 1917. His first assignment was as assistant pastor at St. Catherine's Parish, DuBois from 1917 until August 2, 1918 when he entered the military as a US Army Chaplain. Following his discharge on August 10, 1919, he was appointed assistant pastor at Sacred Heart Church, Sharon where he served until 1924 when he became pastor at St. Hyppolite parish, Frenchtown where he remained until 1929 when he became pastor at St. Eusebius, parish, East Brady on July 5, 1929.

Thomas F. Eustace **Roman Catholic Priest**

Father Thomas Eustace remained at St. Eusebius, Catholic Church nearly 36 years until April 10, 1965 when he retired. During his years at East Brady, he opened two mission parishes; St. Mark's at Sarah Furnace, and St. Richard's at Rimersburg, Pennsylvania.

Jackie Eustace, RIP, age 84, of Kilmaley, County Clare, Ireland passed away on the 9th July 2014. He was laid to rest in Kilmaley cemetery on July 11 following 11am Mass in Connolly church.

Jackie Eustace, son of George and Kathleen (Vaughan) Eustace and grandson of John and Ellen (Thompson) Eustace was featured in the November 2013 issue of the Eustace Families Post.

Jackie was born at Furroor, Kilmaley on 24 April, 1930. He was the oldest child born to George Eustace and Kathleen Vaughan. 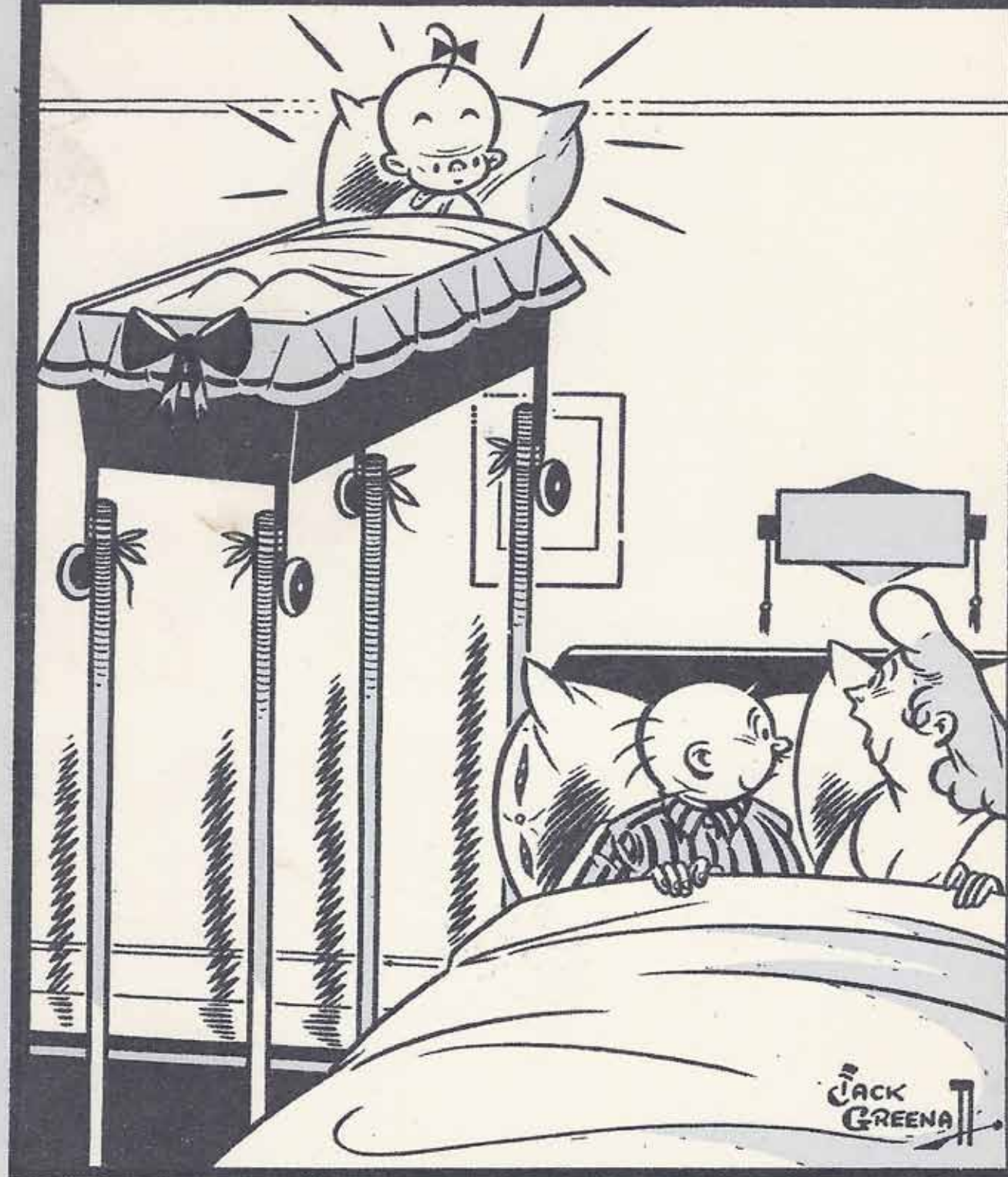
