



Below Jellum's picture is the following writing: "Sandy was a barber for the city of Ellendale for over 20 years. While in service, Sandy used his barbering skills for the benefit of the 5th Marine Division and cut the hair of the troops who raised the flag at Iwo Jima. Sandy stood approximately 200 yards from the flag that was raised that day."

The story was confirmed by Jellum's son, David, who said that his dad had mentioned in particular cutting the hair of Native American Ira Hayes, who was one of the five men depicted in the replica of the event.

Sandy eventually moved to Owatonna. His house was about where the former Owatonna Clinic is located. He did some barbering there for certain customers. From Margie Cook Gilbert in Delmont, South Dakota

Jim and I returned to Delmont, South Dakota from Mesa on April 18 to begin our third summer away from the Arizona heat. Jim had been elected to the board of directors of Dreamland Villa Community Club where we live in Mesa, and on May 7th, he headed back to Mesa to attend a meeting. The following is a post I put on Facebook the afternoon of Mother's Day, May 10.

"How quickly things can change. A tornado roared through Delmont at about 10:35 this morning. I was lucky enough to question the noise I was hearing and checked outside. The siren was going and I saw the funnel cloud coming. Went into the basement with my blankie, headlamp and kindle! Had probably the biggest adrenalin rush of my life as I listened to the house disintegrate above me. Creaking timbers, breaking glass and dust filtering all the way down to the basement. When it was over I climbed the stairs saying "Thank God, I'm alive!" No more old barn, no more garage, no more pump house, no more old hen house. Every window in the house is broken, some of them ripped from their frames. Part of the roof is gone. So many things gone and destroyed, but I have left the most important. ...my life and my friends! The church building I admired from my front porch is a pile of rubble as is the new fire house. A dozen houses gone or severely damaged. I went to Rich and Elle's house after they helped me get my car going. We were evacuated from Delmont while repairs are being made to the infrastructure and removal of trees is being done. We are camped out at Dakota Horizinn in Parkston, about 16 miles from Delmont. May have a paint party this evening! The Paintbrush Studio seems to have escaped damage."

Five weeks into this adventure, things are still unsettled but a little more comfortable. Jim was back in Delmont the evening of the 12th. We spent two weeks at the Dakota HorizInn and then moved to an 800 sf 3 br apartment in Wagner, 18 miles from Delmont. At the long term

recovery meeting we attended on June 11, we learned that the tornado was on the ground for 17 miles, and in Delmont, a town of 234, forty homes were totally destroyed and eight severely damaged. Ours is among the severely damaged, but estimates of repair keep rising and we may demolish and rebuild. My car was totaled and we have replaced it.

The kitchen and dining room of the house were a mess with glass and insulation all over everything, but with minimal damage to the contents, and my daughter came and helped pack things up. A neighbor kindly offered her garage as temporary storage and also started laundering things in her huge washer. After packing 10 boxes of food (I have a large bean, flour and other dry goods collection), my daughter commented "you prepare for the apocalypse and when the apocalypse comes the Red Cross feeds you." We had a stress relieving giggle over that.

The Red Cross and the Salvation Army provided three meals a day for the first week, but we usually only showed up for the evening meal which included a meeting and daily newsletter with updates on the situation from the state disaster people. We had "flush only" water for several days until test results came back from state agencies, but it was good to have that flush capability as we spent much of our days packing and working around the house and yard. Cases of free drinking water were readily available. As well as the Red Cross, we were blessed by the Salvation Army, Adventist Relief Agency, LDS volunteers, Christian Aid Society Disaster Response Team (Mennonites), Lutheran Social Services, and Missouri Synod Disaster Aid. We also received and are still receiving help from many nearby fire departments, lots of volunteers from nearby towns, and other church and community groups that still provide occasional meals after the Red Cross went on to other duties at the end of the first week. Our own "No Place Bar" and the Delmont Steakhouse also fed us numerous times. Lutheran Social Services is still coordinating volunteer efforts and I am amazed at the number of people who spend much of their lives doing this type of work. I have a new respect for volunteerism. Each of the above mentioned agencies have their specialty and they work together well.

We have all read about, and watched TV newscasts about hurricanes, tornadoes, floods, and earthquakes. After a few days, the media goes on to the next big thing. I am sure that few of us have ever realized the long term effort it takes to recover from something like this, and the huge number of people involved in the ongoing projects. Yes, many people lost their homes and we are in mourning over that. Delmont also lost hundreds of trees after losing many in a bad windstorm last year. Loss of about 40% of the town's water customers has had a serious impact on our sewer system. A number of farmers in the area lost many cattle, barns, and stored hay that has to be burned because of the embedded glass and other debris in it. The one acre wood at the base of our driveway that was destroyed was home to deer, wild turkey and other wildlife. We will be picking up bits of glass, shingles, nails and other things from our lawns and fields for a long time to come. The light at the end of the tunnel is still dim, but we know it is there.

The first re-build has begun, but we are still in the "don't know" stage. Someone has left large pots of flowering plants around town. There are offers of trees to re-plant some that were lost, and plans to house donated lumber and appliances etc when the rebuilding gets seriously under way are being made.

In a small town without a school, finding large spaces to house things like this results in a lot of shuffling and sacrificing.

So again, thanks to all the many volunteers and to those that prayed. Keep volunteering and praying!


From Dave & Judy Stanton:





Curtis E. Ringhofer Born Feb. 12, 1945 Died May 13, 1970

"Oh, I can just see him standing there," Elsie Ringhofer says as she examines the old photo. "He was a fun kid. He'd make friends very easily. And oh, what a terror! He'd come up behind me and say, 'Mom, still love me?"

There was almost always one or more of Curtis's friends hanging out at the Ringhofer farm south of Owatonna. "Our place was the center of the action, Elsie said. "That was the place for kids to hang out."

She's not sure just what her son did in the Army. "What do

you do in the Army?" she questions.

One of Curtis's comrades told Elsie her son died quickly, apparently after being shot. "He said, 'He never struggled, so you don't have to worry that he suffered long."

Like many young men of the time Curtis enlisted in the Army because he figured he'd be drafted otherwise.

"He knew he was going to

have to go," said Elsie.
Elsie, whose husband died in 1963, still hears from a few of Curtis's friends.

"What brings back memories is when I see kids his age," she "I hear from them on Memorial Day."

Kathleen, formerly of New Richland, and a four-year-old daughter, Kristine, who's now living married and Minneapolis. Earlier this week, Elsie was preparing a large box of old letters and photos to mail to Kristine.

"His little girl is a pretty one, just like him," she said. As for Curtis's widow, since remarried, says, 'Maybe it's better we don't." She never talks about it. She

"I was just reading the last Curtis left behind his wife letter he sent to us," she said.


