



Full service gas stations were abundant Owatonna People's Press; By Todd Hale

(April 29, 2018)

I received an e-mail from Dave Kofoed of Owatonna relating to my reference to the bell that rang outside a gas station when car pulled up to the pumps. Instead of a cable strung out across the driving lane at the station, Dave told me it actually was a pneumatic tube. As a tire drove over it, the pressure would be increased in the tube thus ringing the bell.

That brings to mind the many service stations that served Owatonna motorists prior to today's self-serve gas pumps. Besides actual service stations, gasoline was sold at neighborhood grocery stores in town as well as in the country.

Each service station had its unique personality. When I came to town, Bob (Bunny) Jurgensen operated the Mobil station located at Main and Park Square. After Jurgensen retired, the station was run by Ralph Srsen. Dave Gerhartz ran the station from 1974 to 1980. When Jurgensen ran the station, I can imagine a lot of county commissioner business was discussed there as Bob served on the county board. He was also a long-time member of the fair board and was Superintendent of Horses for many years.

Here's a listing of other gas stations I remember: There were quite a few stations along Oak Street which carried highway traffic for highway 65. Jay Grunwald's Skelly at Oak and Broadway; Hilary Caron's Standard located across the street; Bud Baldus Texaco further south at Oak and McKinley. Before Baldus, the station was operated by Ken and Vern Kaplan. The station was built by R.C. Jirakowic; there was a Clark Super 100 located at Oak and Vine first operated by Joey Ptacek and later by Oscar Sommers. Joey later opened the Shell station located at the corner of Oak and Holly where a used vehicle lot is now. Across the street, Frank Anderson sold Pure Oil at his grocery store.

The corner of Main and Oak was loaded with gas stations on every corner. On the northwest corner was a Pure Oil run by Sid Wilker. That station changed owners several times. LeRoy Meier, John Kristofferson and Cliff Ward also ran that station. Gordy Ness and Dick Schultz ran the Standard station on the southeast corner of Main and Oak, I.P. Kreutter's State Farm office is located there now. The Conoco station on the southwest corner where J.B. Liquor is now was originally run by Orville Utpadel. Paul Arnfelt, who had been working for Joe Sampson at Sampson Dairy bought the station from Utpadel in 1961. Arnfelt eventually sold the station to Gil Voss. Rich Granowski was the last owner. Remember the Royal gas station across from the Cedar Mall, where Larry's Liquor is now. Arnfelt ran that station as well. It later became a Spur station. The Apco station on the triangle lot on South Oak was first run by Les Hanson and later by Jim Chester who called the station Chet's Apco. A tobacco shop now sits on that property.

Dave Hogate ran Dave's Super Service on the northeast corner of Main and Oak, across from the Pure Oil. The pumps were located under the building with apartments upstairs. He had a garage just to the north.

Bick and Andy's Cities Service was located at Oak and Bridge Street where the Pizza Hut is now. Clarence Bickford and Clayton "Andy" Anderson ran that station and later Andy ran it himself.

Further north at Oak and Pearl Joe Glynn ran another Phillips 66 Station. Across Pearl to the north was Bernie Messing's Standard station where the Subway is now located. Before Bernie, Ken Casperson ran that station.

Now to other parts of town. Jim White operated a station on East Main by the curve on highway 218. Bonded Gas on North Elm was run by Clarence Olson. Cliff Koekeritz ran that station as well. Central Co-Op is still located on North Cedar a block north of the Deep Rock and is a self-serve today. Deep Rock was first operated by Cliff Koekeritz and later by Len Kading.

There were more stations on Cedar Street. Just west of Cedar on Vine was Joe's National Oil, owned and operated by Joe Leverty. Joe had the only station in town with an outdoor pit for changing oil. Joe's station was the first one I patronized as it was located next door to the Arnold Hotel where I first lived.


The first drive-in service station in the US opened in 1913. Motorists had been able to pump their own gas at filling stations since 1905, but those were little more than a pump at the curbside. Before that, motorists bought gasoline in cans from places like pharmacies and blacksmith shops and filled up themselves. Full-service gas stations looked much like they do today. With a brightly illuminated roof, it provided shelter from bad weather, and it had a manager and attendants to help with refueling and repairs. At least four of our classmates worked at filling stations (See below). Stopping at a drive-in gas station was different from pulling over to fuel up. For one thing, it offered new retail opportunities to gas station owners. In addition to gas, the stations also offered free air and water-and sold the first commercial road maps in the United States.

Who can forget Ray Johnson's Phillips 66 at the corner of Cedar and Rose across from the Kitchen restaurant? For decades the station was a landmark business downtown. Ray served both as a city councilman and Mayor for the city so there were a lot of city topics discussed at that gas station. Across from Johnson's Phillips 66 was Howie's Standard, run by Howard Schroeder. I remember a major fire at that station which seriously burned Howard's son, Mike who was down in the "pit" at the time.

A Texaco and later a Sinclair station located at State and Hoffman Drive where O'Reilly's Auto Parts store is now. The station ran a live bait shop. John Westphal was the last owner of that station. Across the road was a DX station owned by Elmer Steele who ran the Steele Oil Co. Stub Jones and Les Abraham both worked for Steele at the DX station.

The last gas station that offered full service at the pumps was Manke's. (Shown above). I can still see the Manke brothers all sitting in chairs in the office waiting for customers coming to fill up. Yes, they did it all....pumped your gas, washed your windshield and even checked your oil and tire air pressure. Many senior citizens, who didn't like pumping their own gas, all patronized Manke's.

Manke Service was started in 1946 by Fred Manke Sr (1st Generation) and Ervin Manke (2nd Generation) as a Shell filling station delivering gas with a bulk truck to farmers and a trucking business.

So, there you have them...all the service stations I remember when I came to town in 1959. **7odd Hale**

If everything goes according to schedule, by the time I see all of you August 18th in Owatonna, I will have a new left knee.



The facility will use irradiation, the most effective and environmentally friendly technology available to eliminate harmful insect pests that can "hitch hike" on fruits destined for export to the US and other countries.

The highlight of the year will be in October at the World Dairy Expo in Madison, WI when I will receive the National Dairy Shrine Pioneer Award and be inducted into the National Dairy Hall of Fame.


Ron Eustice elected to National Dairy Hall of Fame

National Dairy Shrine will honor five individuals on October 4th for their lifetime service with the coveted Pioneer Award during World Dairy Expo in Madison, Wisconsin. These gentlemen are outstanding representatives of the dairy industry. Their recognition as Pioneers of the National Dairy Shrine adds to the honor roll of leaders in the National Dairy Hall of Fame.

Ronald Eustice of Burnsville, Minnesota and Tucson, Arizona has dedicated more than 50 years of service to the dairy and beef industries. Ron was born in Waseca, Minnesota and received his schooling at Owatonna High School, the University of Minnesota and later received a Masters in Business Administration.

Ron started his career out of college with Successful Farming magazine as a marketing specialist. His talent was soon recognized by the breeding industry and he began a 7 year association with Carnation Genetics. First headquartered in Mexico where he directed sales and taught A.I. technique to dairyman in their Spanish language. Ron ultimately became General Manager of Carnation Genetics. In 1977 Ron became the International Marketing Director of American Breeders Service. Later in 1984 Mr. Eustice became the International Marketing Director for Land O' Lakes and was involved with technology transfer and farmer training in countries around the world including a three year assignment in Indonesia where he lectured in the Bahasa Indonesian language.

During his career, Ronald has represented the U.S. dairy industry in more than 80 countries. He has authored or co-authored multiple educational articles in national dairy and beef publications as well as several chapters in food safety text books.

Ron was an early promoter of red and white dairy cattle. He purchased his first red and white dairy cow in 1963 when he was a college freshman working in the University of Minnesota dairy barn. This passion for the breed led him to be successful in the show ring as well. In 1968, he showed the first prize three year- old and Reserve Grand Champion at the first National Red and White Show at World Dairy Expo.

His passion for Red & White genetics has led him to author the most comprehensive book on the history of Red & Whites in the United States, "They Saw Red". His next book entitled "Polled Pioneers: History of Naturally Hornless Dairy Cattle in North America" will be the definitive text on U.S. polled gene history.

Ron served Minnesota beef and dairy producers for more than 22 years as Minnesota Beef Council Executive Director and developed the nation's first Dairy/Beef Quality Assurance training program.

We have friends and family who share our joy and some who don't get it. The ones that do not understand have not really spent much time reading the New Testament. If one concentrates on the actions and words of Christ we see that it is money changers who are really the ones in trouble!!

Lowell has been given a diagnosis of Lewy Body disease. It has progressed very slowly so far and for that we are most thankful. He has been my caregiver this past year as I have recovered from a redo of a 15 year old total knee replacement; a cervical fusion; and a lumbar fusion.

I believe that many of you will think or perhaps say to others that openly sharing as I have in this newsletter is not OK. Well, I believe we have a very few precious years left to honestly talk about important things. I hope that my frankness is just seen as me being me. I hope the same for all of you--be yourself, every other role is already spoken for!

One more thing, do not offer me a wine cooler, I used to really like them. I know I have another slip possibility in me...I do not know if I have the strength for another recovery. It is really, really hard work and I am getting tired.



The full time population in Crosslake is about 2,400 but that increases to around 25,000 during the summer months so it draws quite a crowd.








The Owatonna Manufacturing Company was started in 1865 as a partnership between Michael F. Lowth and Thomas J. Howe, the firm name being Lowth & Howe. In 1873, H. N. LaBare purchased one-half of Mr. Lowth's interest, and the firm continued until 1878 under the name of Lowth, Howe & LaBare. At this time, Mr. Lowth disposed of his interest, and the name was changed to Howe & Co. On August 20, 1888, the company was Farmers soon recognized the OMC paint colors of red and lime green on grain drills, seeders. elevators and balers.

In 1928, OMC began making portable farm elevators in 1928 after purchasing the Diedrick Company. Indeed, for a while OMC continued the production of the Diedrich (even under the Diedrich name). In 1965, OMC introduced their first "Mustang" skid steer.

In 1997 Mustang was separated from OMC and sold to the Gehl Corporation. OMC, itself was sold to the Manitou Americas Inc., a French company. Source: History of Rice & Steele Counties, Minnesota, Illustrated, Vol. II; Compiled by Franklin Curtiss-Wedge (1910) transcribed by Susan Geist.



S&H Green Stamps were a line of trading stamps popular in the United States from the 1930s until the late 1980s. They were distributed as part of a rewards program operated by the Sperry & Hutchinson company (S&H), founded in 1896 by Thomas Sperry and Shelley Byron Hutchinson. During the 1960s, the company promoted its rewards catalog as being the largest publication in the United States and boasted that it issued three times as many stamps as the U.S. Postal Service. Customers would receive stamps at the checkout counter of supermarkets, department stores, and gasoline stations among other retailers, which could be redeemed for products in the catalog. Among many stores offering S&H Green Stamps to customers were Simon's Mineral Spring Grocery owned by Jon Simon's parents and Thompsen Grocery (owned by Doris' parents, Dorothy and Leo Thompsen) in Meriden, Minnesota.







The National Farmers' Bank of Owatonna, Minnesota, is a historic bank building designed by Louis Sullivan, with decorative elements by George Elmslie. 
Carol (Dinse) Marold (March 4, 1945-April 5, 2018)


Lives Remembered


Michael B. Storm (1944-2018)

55th Owatonna High School Class of 1963 Reunion

There must be an imbalance in time and space. I am mystified by the speed of time as we age, no one told me about that obscure occurrence? On August 18th, my wife and I drove to Owatonna, MN for my 55th class reunion, Sixty classmates attended plus spouses, ninety classmates were no shows. Forty-one photos of the deceased, were displayed on a blue draped table. I would imagine that one or two or more of those forty-one were a good friend of at least one of us if not more. It was a sobering moment and a reminder that our future is getting shorter and we too, will eventually be a black and white photo in a clear plastic 5" X 8" display, sitting on a table covered with a silver & blue cloth, our school colors.

It was a joyful gathering, other than the frozen stares from the table watching us move about. Sixty living, breathing classmates from decades past had gathered, some, once good friends and may still be, others, school acquaintances, and some just faces from classrooms of 30, the ones that we never really got to know. Now it makes no difference, other than the memories of certain students that some share and some missed, or the relationships with the teachers, be it good, bad or indifferent. Mine was with "Barney" Anderson, my art teacher for five years; we became good friends, never to be forgotten. And Mr. Bennet, who truly made a difference in my life, not only by encouraging reading and poetry but art too.

Every time I go to a reunion, starting with the ten-year reunion, I find it harder to recognize the faces as we all change in looks and physical appearance. Whoever invented the sticky name tag with a picture on it, should be praised. But the voices and eyes don't change, the expression of happiness to see one another is real and lasting. I was making my way around the airport hangar, full of people with no plane in site, but decorated with reminders of our past, lest we forget and appetizers to sooth the apprehensive stomach. My mind was reeling with memories of going through my first seventeen years of life with all these people. At eighteen we were set free with basic book knowledge of the world around us to face the adult world that lay ahead. Now here we were, at the end of the adventure of finding ourselves, some still chasing their dreams others just enjoying the breath of a beautiful day and the pleasure of a warm breeze bringing the sweet smell of the earth to our senses.

I searched for particular people that I stored in the cache of my aging brain, a few men, a few women, memorable souls that had touched my young world one way or another. They come to mind throughout my life when something triggers a random memory. One was Judy Reese. Always a smile on her face, that same beautiful smile still remains. There was something special about her, maybe it was her will-o'-thewisp energy, or just the pleasure of knowing her and talking to her and sharing our thoughts.

After Fifty-five years we can still smile at each other and hug and feel the undefinable human bond of someone that is in the same *Karass, that never goes away.

My father had a sporting goods store at the north end of town, set back about 100 feet from the old highway with other nearby businesses. Directly across the street was a tiny diner, Beer's café, owned by Art Beers a one-time professional boxer. Going north of the diner, closer to the highway were some other miscellaneous businesses maybe four; one in particular was the Wildung Alfalfa Mill with its potent odor that would fill the air in the fall with enough exotic (to me) fragrance to make my head spin. On the south side of the diner was a very small stucco off-white house, right next door to Art's place. There were no other residential houses for a couple of miles just more businesses and another highway pointed towards Waseca. I imagine the house was built for the original owner of the diner.

My father started the sporting goods store when I was twelve. I helped him on weekends in the fall for hunting season, an extremely busy time of year and sometimes in the summer. I was always fascinated with the oddity of that little house. Then, a year or two later a new family moved in, a mother and her pretty daughter with a large, all white German Shepard, a magnificent dog that everyone loved.

Much to my surprise the daughter was my age and went to Owatonna High. If I had seen her before I didn't remember, it seemed to me she came from a distant land, mystery followed her with some sort of mystic shroud surrounding the three of them. At that time, 1959-60 perhaps, a single woman with child in a small town of 15,000 was notable. In 1960 the average family had 2.3 children and generally the fathers worked and the mother stayed home with the children; this house didn't follow the statistics.

Her name was Kathy Pobanz. When I worked at the store I wanted to get to know her better but I really didn't have the courage or much opportunity. I also had enough going on to keep me busy. Plus, I had a motorcycle and a car and if you had a car in the early 60's in high school, you were on the move and you had it made. So why I never asked her out I'll never know? Probably fear of rejection ... maybe, maybe not?

At this reunion Kathy and I finally had some time to talk, mostly small talk including a cute story about her dog. She told me that her Shepard went down the road to Prinzing's market and stole three smoked fish and brought them home to eat. The fish let out an awful stink especially after three carcasses lay in the back yard for some time in the sun, the smell didn't go unnoticed. It was an easy crime to solve, no one went to jail, the culprit was dealt with and all was forgiven. A stern talk was the punishment which he probably didn't understand a word of, but NO. I know how that is, I love smoked fish.

I knew little of Kathy's mother other than causally running into her at Art's place with a few greetings, never asked a question, so I lived in fascination, of their unique situation. I wanted to know more but never did.

Kathy graduated, married Stan Schuster, a member of our state wrestling championship team. He defended me once in high school gym class, making the guy trying to whip me with a wet towel sorry he ever tried. That ended wet towel whipping permanently in the shower room! I was always grateful for that.

I told her my story at the reunion, of the intrigue that captured my mind and made her a wonder woman to me from Themyscira (Paradise Island). I just wanted to greet her and talk to her, find out how she has been. I find that sometimes the mystery that surrounds a person, place or situation is sweeter than the reality of it, it allows the imagination to run free. Like a fine wine, I don't want to know the process of its making, I just want to savor the flavor and enjoy the moment. In some cases, too much knowledge can ruin the reverie. I will continue to live in the mystery of it all, content but I'll never forget looking out those large front windows of the sporting goods store, having short glimpses of Kathy moving about like a gentle summer breeze.

John Hudrlik was there, he and Verna came all the way from southern Nevada. John was the first friend I met in Owatonna, at four years old in nursery school at Roosevelt Elementary. My mother worked days, she would put me in anything she could in the summer to occupy my time. John and I hit it off right away and still stay in touch. It was John that let the slide go on his trombone in Mr. Lian's music class, at the end of a number, all was quiet as Marc Reigel, John and myself watched the slide descending three tiers to rest at Mr. Lian's feet. With a quick pointed finger, he kicked John out of the class. We still laugh at that.

I still remember the time in Kaplan Woods when me, Jerry Carstensen, on our bikes, ate a whole jar of olives. Boy Scouts united many of us especially the camping trips, so much fun, Hoksila was the best. One year the camp ran an obstacle course; Paul Lian came in first, me second. He barely beat me but he was fast, same in track, I always wondered how he could be so fast for his size? Maybe from big guys chasing after him?

I don't know why time now seems to move so fast, maybe it's global warming, or faulty memories or maybe it's knowing our time is waning? What really matters is that we make the most out of it and think less of the end and more of the good things left ahead.










About Steele County:

Steele County, Minnesota was officially organized February 20, 1855 and originally included what is now known as Waseca County. Re-organization in 1856 established the boundaries we recognize today. The new county was named in honor of Franklin Steele, a St. Anthony governmental contractor and a man of prominence. The first county building, built in 1874 at a cost of \$5,000, was a one-story brick building which has since been demolished. The historic Steele County Courthouse was built in 1891 for \$50,000. It has been remodeled several times and is used solely by the courts. Two courtrooms and one hearing room are available, as well as meeting rooms and office space. In 1860 Steele County had a population of 2,863 as compared to 21,155 in 1950 and 36,755 as of 2015. Steele County has numerous streams and natural springs. The largest of the streams is the Straight River and the largest lake is Rice Lake. Nine mineral springs are located in Owatonna, in an area known as Mineral Springs Park.
